Dr Andrew Baranowski - How to integrate pain interventions into general patient care

Dr Andrew Baranowski is a consultant in Pain Medicine. He was key in setting up University College London Hospital Foundation Trust's Pain Management Centre, currently based at The National Hospital for Neurology, Queen Square, London. Dr Baranowski is the Royal College of Anaesthetists Regional Advisor for Training, North London and a member of the London Pain Training Advisory Group. He is Chairman of the Pain Subsection of the Royal Society of Medicine, and also of SPIN (a charity for international support in the field of pain medicine) and past president of IASP's special interest group for urogenital pain (PUGO).



Dr Allan Gordon - Pharmacotherapy for urogenital pain

Dr Allan Gordon is the Director of the Wasser Pain Management Centre at Mount Sinai Hospital. Dr Gordon joined the staff of Mount Sinai Hospital as a clinical neurologist in 1975. He was Head of Neurology at Mount Sinai from 1980 to 1997. He is on staff at the University Health Network and is an Associate Professor at the University of Toronto. Dr Gordon's initial area of interest was neuromuscular disease. He then established the Craniofacial Pain Research Unit devoted to the diagnosis and treatment of people with facial pain and headache, and now has a focus in pelvic pain.



Dr Daniel Shoskes - The UPOINT Phenotype: Classifying and treating chronic prostatitis/chronic pelvic pain syndrome

Dr Daniel Shoskes is a Urologist and Professor of Surgery at the Glickman Urological and Kidney Institute in Cleveland OH. He trained in Urology at the University of Toronto and in Renal Transplantation in Oxford, UK and Cleveland OH. His clinical and research interests include chronic prostatitis/chronic pelvic pain syndrome, interstitial cystitis and kidney transplantation. Recent research has focused on developing clinically relevant phenotypes in chronic pelvic pain that can most effectively guide therapy.



Dr Kenneth Peters - Multidisciplinary approach to urologic chronic pain in women: The Beaumont Experience

Dr Kenneth Peters is the Chairman of the Department of Urology at William Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak, Michigan as well as Clinical Professor of Urology at Oakland University William Beaumont School of Medicine. He carries the title of The Peter & Florine Ministrelli Distinguished Chair in Urology. He is Chairman of the AUA Urology Core Curriculum Section for Pelvic Pain and Interstitial Cystitis.



Dr Michel Pontari - Mechanisms in chronic prostatitis/chronic pelvic pain syndrome

Dr Michel Pontari is a Professor of Urology at Temple University School of Medicine in Philadelphia. A neurourologist by training, his research interests include both Interstitial Cystitis and Chronic Prostatitis. He was a participant in the Chronic Prostatitis Collaborative Research Network for 11 years, and is currently the co-chair of the Executive Committee of the NIH sponsored Multidisciplinary Approach to Pelvic Pain (MAPP) study.



Dr Dean Tripp - Understanding and beating pain catastrophizing in CPPS treatment

Dr Dean Tripp is an Associate Professor of Psychology, Anesthesiology and Urology at Queen's. He has lectured internationally on pain, coping and QoL and is recognized for excellence in teaching. Dr Tripp has established the Pain Research Laboratory at Queen's University. His research focuses on biopsychosocial mechanisms in chronic pelvic pain in men and women. He is an active member of the Canadian Pain Society and IASP.



Dr J Curtis Nickel - Urologic chronic pelvic pain: a practical way forward

Dr J Curtis Nickel is Professor of Urology at Queen's University at Kingston, staff urologist at Kingston General Hospital and CIHR Canada Research Chair in Urologic Pain and Inflammation. He has established the Kingston Prostatitis and Interstitial Cystitis Chronic Pelvic Pain Research Clinics, funded for the last 15 years with peer reviewed grants from NIH, CIHR and industry.
